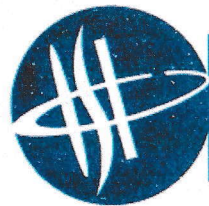

Avitha Sooful

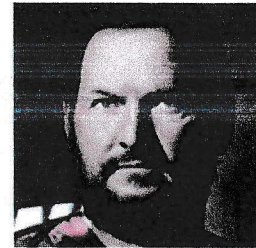

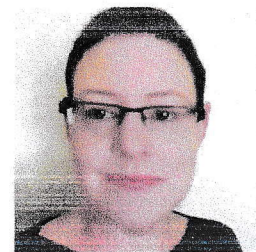

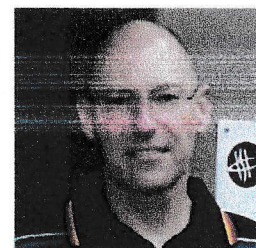


Runette Kruger

Gordon has been actively involved in the South African and international art world as artist, educator, curator and gallerist for more than 30 years. He has shown on hundreds of solo and group shows.

He graduated with a BA (FA) honours from the University of Witwatersrand and a master's from the University of Johannesburg, where he runs the Sculpture Department as a senior lecturer.

He has curated numerous group exhibitions that have traveled the country. He regularly shows on more than 20 exhibitions a year, including showing in Washington, Holland and Paris.



Alexander Ellis

Three sculptures were selected for an exhibition of South African sculpture in the Hague in May 2012, one of which was acquired by the SA Embassy there. He showed at Nirox Sculpture Park and at Stellenbosch Botanical Gardens as part of the 'Heavy Metal' outdoor sculpture exhibition in 2013 and 2014. He recently curated two shows of SA contemporary art to Appalachian State University, North Carolina and the Beijing Biennale 2015 which were also shown at the Pretoria Art Museum and the University of Johannesburg art gallery.

Runette is Head of the Department of Fine and Applied Arts at the Tshwane University of Technology. She serves on the Council of the Arts Association of Pretoria and is a member of the South African Journal of Art History, the South African Visual Art Historians and Ceramics Southern Africa.

She served as examiner and moderator at undergraduate and postgraduate levels at North West

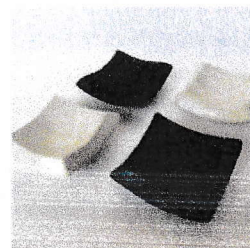
University, the Durban University of Technology, The University of Pretoria and the University of Johannesburg. She was also peer reviewer for the recognition of artistic output at the University of Pretoria and associate editor of the International Journal for the Arts in Society.

Awards include Young Researcher of the Year, Faculty of the Arts, TUT, Woman Researcher of the Year, Faculty of the Arts TUT and Lecturer of the Year, Faculty of the Arts, TUT. She is enrolled for a PhD in Visual Studies at the University of Pretoria and her research interests include utopia, cities, globalisation, agency and dissent.

Three exhibitions at Association of Arts, Pretoria

The new earthenware ceramics, an exhibition of hand-painted ceramic plates by Philip Badenhorst opens on Friday 1 July 2016 and will last until 20 July.

Die stoet, the procession, an exhibition of recent work by Kobus Rossouw and Die reisverhale van Albertus Vercluyt, an anthology of poetry by Willem Punt with artwork by Kobus Rossouw, is open until 6 July.



The Potter of the Month is Robert Wagener, with the official opening on Sunday, 3 July. It coincides with the monthly Pretoria Art Meander when the gallery is open from 10:00 to 14:00 on the first Sunday of the month.

Robert is a potter who made his mark overseas. In 2015 he was selected as a finalist for the prestigious Zanesville Price for Contemporary Ceramics in Ohio in the USA. He started with conventional wheel work and lately became more and more innovative, attempting more sculptural pieces and experimenting with other materials such as metals, woods and glass.

ArtKaroo is turning things inside out. The frame becomes the artwork...

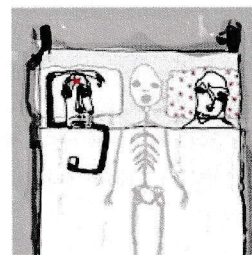

See the For sale project at the Pretoria Art Museum

The Swaziland-born artist Banele Khoza initially studied fashion at the then London International School of Fashion and then studied fine art at the Tshwane University of Technology. Over the past three years he made his way through the Pretoria Art Museum's Education and Development Programme as a tour guide and visual art workshop facilitator, and last year participated as artist in the For Sale Project Exhibition's group show component.



For this inaugural solo component of For Sale Project Exhibition series, the artist has worked on a new body of work consisting of about 44 artworks, 25 of which were selected for his first solo exhibition entitled *Temporary Feelings*. The body of work covers various artistic techniques such as painting, drawing, digital printing and installation art.

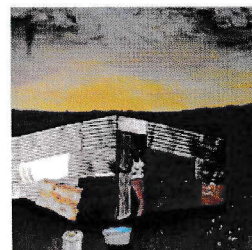
Khoza's work is playful and expressive with metaphorical undertones. Painting is approached with loose, flat-brush strokes on a neutral-to-warm colour palette. The incorporation of handwritten text in the surface creates visual interplay imagery that engages the viewer optically and intellectually in an open-ended conversation.

The exhibition has been made possible by the support of Be Part of the Miracle Trust, and will be on show from 9 July to 4 September.

Day-to-Day

An exhibition by Ismael Shivute at the National Art Gallery of Namibia in Windhoek from 23 June to 2 July.

Shivute's latest body of work is made up of depictions of his community, drawing images from the area in which he lives. These images are not only about his surroundings but are also made out of his surroundings. With the use of found materials Shivute captures both the spirit and the tangibility of his world.
